Postsecondary Access Supports

Pennsylvania

 Tuition waiver program with single point of contact to help eligible students identify and apply for services such as financial aid and scholarships, gather verification documents, and access campus and community resources and support services

<u>California</u>

- Priority registration to SEFC for courses at all public colleges and universities
- Social work case-management priority to identify a person to assist young people in foster care aged 16 and older with college applications and financial aid

<u>Nevada</u>

 Requires schools to identify students living in foster care or who are homeless and to review these students' academic plans as appropriate to maximize the pupil's accrual of credits and progress towards graduation. and applications

Financial Supports

<u>Minnesota</u>

 Fostering Independence Higher Education Grant (FIG) that waives tuition and covers the full cost of attendance (including housing, food, books, transportation and personal expenses) for up to five years

<u>Arizona</u>

 Use supplementary Chafee Education and Training Voucher funds provided under the Supporting Foster Youth and Families Through the Pandemic Act (2020) to pay off financial enrollment holds, so that these students could attend their programs of study





Financial Supports cont.

<u>California</u>

<u>Nevada</u>

- Allows use of Chafee ETV grant for up to two years before losing access due to inadequate academic progress.
- ✓ Safeguards students' funding from being used at institutions that have unsatisfactory graduation or loan default rates.
- ✓ Offers every low-income K-12 student a college savings account seeded with \$500 and provides an additional \$500 for SEFC

 ✓ Individual Development Account (IDA) Program that includes savings account with up to a 5-to-1 matching program for up to \$3,000 in savings that can be used for postsecondary education and financial literacy





Campus-Based Supports

<u>Virginia</u>

 System-wide community college model that provides coaching, academic and career guidance, and financial literacy support to students with foster care experience on campus

<u>New York</u>

- Establish Foster Youth College Success Initiative (FYCSI) which offers a combination of support services and financial resources that can be used to cover SEFC's tuition expenses, housing, transportation, medical costs and personal expenses.
- Establish Foster College Success Initiative (FCSI-NYC); a year-round program that provides housing, tutoring, coaching and financial support to students in NYC foster care

<u>California</u>

 SEFC postsecondary support programs at community colleges that include broad education-specific services such as academic and career advising and transfer guidance, and additional wrap around supports





Single Points of Contact Supports



 Require public postsecondary institutions to appoint at least one employee to serve as a foster care liaison to disseminate information about available support services and other resources available to SEFC

<u>Michigan</u>

 Implement Independent living campus coaches who assist students entering college after exiting the foster care system and assist with independent living skills, including education, employment, housing, parenting, mental health, budgeting/financial management and daily living

<u>Florida</u>

Provide postsecondary
educational campus coaching
positions that are embedded
into Florida College System to
provide SEFC with dedicated,
on-campus support



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Housing Supports

California

- Create the Transitional Housing Program-Plus (THP-Plus) to provides safe, affordable housing and supportive services for up to 36 months and up to age 25. As of Fiscal Year 2021/22 the state provides \$51.9 million annually for this program
- ✓ Require public universities to give SEFC priority for uninterrupted, year-round oncampus housing including housing that is available during academic breaks at no extra charge



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Workforce Development

Washington

- Expanded Passport to College program to include registered apprenticeships. Offers case management, planning, institutional support, financial assistance, career development and wraparound services.
- ✓ Data sharing agreement between the WSAC and the Department of Children, Youth & Families (DCYF) to verify foster care status

Ohio, Nevada, California

 ✓ Waiver from Department of Labor to reduce the percent of funding that a local Workforce Development Board must spend on out-ofschool youth in order to allow these programs to serve a greater number of youth with experience in foster care, juvenile justice systems or homelessness who are in school.

- ✓ Let lived experience guide your work.
- \checkmark The work doesn't start when session starts.
- \checkmark Find your allies and champions.
- ✓ Know your challengers.
- ✓ Collaborate Always. Compromise Sometimes.
- \checkmark When possible hire support.
- \checkmark Know that it's a marathon and not a sprint.







Best practices & looking ahead

Students are the experts of their own histories and policies and programs should center their voices and resiliency



A policy agenda should both account for the broad needs of students, gaps in support and should be well-articulated, adequately funded, and have some measure of accountability.

Policies should be created with an interdisciplinary approach that considers other complementary initiatives and collaborates across sectors
