

California Department of Housing and Community Development



HOMEKEY TARGET POPULATION

 Homekey was created as an opportunity for local public agencies to quickly acquire, rehabilitate or master lease motels and other housing types to increase their communities' capacity to respond to COVID-19 pandemic.



 The target population is individuals and families who are experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness.
 People experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness were considered inherently impacted by COVID-19.



AVAILABLE FUNDING

	Funding Details
Total Homekey Allocation	\$2.75 billion in funding to expand the Homekey program.
Homekey Round 2 NOFA	 Approximately \$1.45 billion grant funds: \$1.2 billion is derived from the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund (CSFRF) \$250 million state General Fund
	 Over-the-counter application process with a threshold score of 120 or greater needed.
	Awards made on a rolling, first come, first served basis.

ELIGIBLE USES

Acquisition and/or rehabilitation of, but not limited to:

- Motels and hotels
- Apartments or homes
- Manufactured housing
- Commercial properties
- Other buildings with existing uses that could be converted to permanent or interim housing







Other eligible uses:

- Master leasing of properties for noncongregate housing
- New construction of dwelling units
- The purchase of affordability covenants and restrictions for units
- Relocation costs
- Capitalized operating subsidies for units purchased, converted, constructed, or altered with funds provided pursuant to HSC section 50675.1.3

HOMEKEY CAPITAL AWARD EXPENDITURE DEADLINE



- Homekey capital award must be spent within 8 months of award.
- All rehab must be completed within one year of award.
- Opportunity for extension for circumstances outside the control of the sponsor.





HOMELESS YOUTH SET-ASIDE

 "No less than 8%" of the Homekey funds shall go to projects serving homeless youth (Chapter 111, Statutes of 2021)

The Homekey Round 2 NOFA:

- Defines Homeless Youth or Youth At Risk of Homelessness, per Title 24 CFR 578.3. May expand population to include current and former foster youth through 25 years old.
- Prioritizes projects with at least 25% youth units, but Homekey has funded projects with less units as well.
- Projects can be 100% youth, or a mix of youth and other units.
- Requires youth-centric supportive services.
- Funds youth units at a premium per-door amount for both capital and operating.

HOMELESS YOUTH SET-ASIDE - STATUS

- To date, Homekey has awarded \$71.6 million to support youth units (62% of youth set-aside).
 - \$60.5 million for capital, \$11.1 million for operations.
 - \$44.4 million left to award under Round 2.

- About half has been awarded to mixed population projects and half to youth-only projects.
 - Represents a total of 249 youth assisted units and 4 Homekey-funded manager units.

- Supportive services:
 - Abode Services to serve residents of the homeless and chronically homeless units.
 - VOICES to provide enhanced services to transition-age youth population.







Ventura County: Chelsee Benté Russell

- Homeless PIT Count grew approx.
 25% following the onset of the pandemic.
- CSU Channel Islands (public university in VC) saw the number of students seeking emergency basic needs resources double between March and September 2020.
- There are limited resources for transition-age youth in Ventura County.
