Key Differences



Trauma and its Effects on Learning

75% of Foster Youth Move K-12 Schools at Least Once

almost 25% moved schools four or more times

Foster youth are 3x more likely to be homeless.

Among foster youth who later enroll in community college, they typically have a lower GPA and earn fewer credits in their first year compared to their peers.

#1 - NextUp Community College Social Worker

- More like a Community College Social Worker than a Community College Counselor
 - SEP is the easiest part of this work
- Wholistic Counseling My Approach and Philosophy
- Funding & Counselor/Student Ratio





#2 - Schedule 1 Hour Appointments

Meet with first-time students 1-2 weeks before the semester starts

> FA Forms Academic Standing Class Registration

5-minute meetings are the minimum, expect more for those students who need it.





#3 - Use Your Counseling Skills!

- Unconditional Regard
- Ask Deeper Questions/Open-Ended Questions
- Reflective Listening
- Validation
- Praise the effort not the result
- Highly Recommend Motivational Interview Training

#3 - Use Your Counseling Skills!

- You will NEED a lot of favors!
- Financial Aid Staff and Director
- Business Office Manager
- Instructors
- Tip Close the loop. I follow up with the staff person who helped to let them know they helped a student get food or clothes, or they helped a student get into hotel because they were homeless. And I let them know I appreciate their help, and that what they're doing is having a direct impact on improving our students' lives.


