


This Guide is intended to complement the Financial Aid Guide for California Foster and Unaccompanied Homeless Youth with screen shots of the online California Dream Act Application (CADAA) and detailed step-by-step instructions for youth who have experienced foster care or homelessness.

Who Should Use This Guide

This guide is intended for youth who have experienced foster care or homelessness in California who qualify for "Independent Student Status" on the CADAA. Students who do not qualify for "Independent Student Status," will need to provide financial information about their parent(s). Information about providing parental information is not included in this guide.

Students who do not qualify as homeless but who cannot obtain parental information can request an exemption for unusual circumstances such as an abusive family, parental incarceration or when parents' whereabouts are unknown (see section 4(c)). Note that circumstances such as parents not providing financial support or being unwilling to provide information on the CADAA do not alone qualify as unusual circumstances.

If a student is a U.S. Citizen or eligible noncitizen,* they should fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) instead of the CADAA to qualify for both state and federal aid. A Visual Guide to the FAFSA is available at ibay.org/resources/financial-aid-guide.

What to Know Before You Apply

What is the CADAA?

- The CADAA allows undocumented and nonresident documented students who meet certain eligibility requirements to apply for state financial aid such as the Cal Grant and Chafee Grant.
- Students who complete the CADAA are not eligible for federal financial aid, like the Federal Pell Grant.
- It also allows qualified students to pay in-state resident fees (instead of higher out-of-state fees) at California's public colleges and universities.



- Free Application for Federal Student Aid
- Available to U.S. Citizens, permanent residents or other <u>eligible non-citizens</u>*
- Apply at FAFSA.gov (mobile friendly)
- Available in English or Spanish online
- Used for Federal and State aid

*This most commonly includes someone who is a U.S. Permanent Resident (i.e. someone with a "green card" or Resident Alien Card) or a refugee. For the full list of eligible non-citizens, see studentaid.gov/understand-aid/eligibility/requirements/non-us-citizens.

Who is eligible to submit a CADAA?

- Undocumented Students Who Meet AB 540 Criteria: Assembly Bill (AB) 540 is a bill that passed in California. It specifies which undocumented students are eligible for state financial aid and in-state tuition fees. Not all undocumented students are all eligible. See the next page for the full list of eligibility criteria.
- Students with a U Visa: A "U Visa" is a type of nonimmigrant visa for victims of certain crimes who have suffered mental or physical abuse and are helpful to law enforcement in the investigation or prosecution of such criminal activity.
- <u>Students with Temporary Protected Status</u> (TPS): Students hold a temporary immigration status because they are unable to return to their home country safely due to conditions or circumstances like war, environmental disasters, or epidemics.

AB 540 Eligibility

The CADAA asks questions to determine if an undocumented student meets AB 540 criteria, which allows the student to receive in-state tuition and state financial aid.

To qualify for AB 540, a student must satisfy ALL of the criteria shown.

Do you meet the AB540 criteria list below?

- 1. Satisfaction of either of the following:
 - A. High school attendance in California for three or more years, OR
 - B. Attainment of credits earned in California from a California high school equivalent to three or more years of full-time high school coursework and a total of three or more years of attendance in California elementary schools, California secondary schools, or a combination of those schools. **OR**
 - C. Attainment of credits earned at a California adult school, OR
 - D. Credits earned at a California Community College, OR
 - E. A combination of the schools listed above
- Graduated or will graduate from a California high school, OR
 Attainment of General Education Development (GED), High School
 Equivalency Test (HiSET), Test Assessing Secondary Completion (TASC),
 OR
 - Attainment of an associate degree from a California Community College, **OR**Fulfillment of minimum transfer requirements from a California Community
 College to a University of California or California State University, **AND**
- Will register or enroll in an accredited and qualifying California college or university, AND
- 4. If applicable, complete(d) an affidavit to legalize immigration status as soon as you are eligible, **AND**
- 5. Do not hold a valid non-immigrant visa (F, J, H, L, A, B, C, D, E, etc.)*

*Note: If you have Temporary Protected Status or hold a U Visa select "Yes"

Does DACA status or having a Social Security Number impact eligibility?

- Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) status is not required to apply for the CADAA.
- If you received DACA status and you have a Social Security card, but it says "VALID FOR WORK ONLY WITH DHS AUTHORIZATION" you are not eligible to complete the FAFSA. You must meet the AB 540 criteria on the prior slide to be eligible for the CADAA.
- Your parent's citizenship status does not impact your eligibility to receive financial aid under the CADAA or FAFSA.

What about Special Immigration Juvenile Status (SIJS)?

- Foster youth who are undocumented immigrants may qualify to receive Special Immigration Juvenile Status (SIJS). Undocumented children who are a dependent of the juvenile court who cannot be reunified with one or both of their parents due to abuse, abandonment or neglect, and for whom it is not in their best interest to return to their country of nationality, may be able to obtain SIJS and apply to become a lawful permanent resident, also known as obtaining your Green Card.
- Students with a pending application for SIJS are not eligible for federal financial aid and should submit the CADAA until they have received permanent resident status (i.e., a Green Card/Alien Registration).
- If an undocumented student in foster care does not have an application for SIJS pending, the child welfare agency should be contacted for eligibility screening.

CADAA Information is Private!

- CADAA information is not shared with the Federal government
- The California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) protects the confidentiality of student records
- CSAC has never shared any information about a student's immigration status, documented or undocumented
- CSAC also complies with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), which protects the privacy of student education records

To qualify for state and institutional aid:

CA Community Colleges:

September 2, 2025

Private or out of state colleges may have different deadlines. If you've missed these deadlines, you can still apply. While most state aid will no longer be available, some grants, such as the Federal Pell Grant, will still be available.

^{*}Priority deadlines can change. Be sure to check for the latest information.

What a student needs to apply



An email address AND a list of at least one and up to 20 colleges



Information about current assets, such as cash, and checking/savings accounts



Tax return or income information from the "prior-prior" year (2023). If you filed a tax return, also have your Social Security number or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) (optional)



Statewide Student Identifier (SSID): a 10-digit number that is given to all students enrolled in a California elementary, middle or high school. This is optional but recommended.



School transcript information needed to demonstrate that school attendance satisfies AB 540 criteria (see next page for more information).

AB 540: School Transcripts

- Students will need to provide information on the CADAA about their school attendance history to determine AB 540 eligibility. **This information includes credits or hours** attained at each school and the dates the student attended each school.
- Depending on how they are meeting AB 540 eligibility, the student may have to provide information about elementary, middle, and high schools, adult schools, and/or community colleges they attended.
- Students should report all relevant school history, even if they attended a school for a short time and received partial credits.
- Students should work with their school counselor to obtain transcripts and review the transcripts to ensure they have the information (credits/hours/dates) needed to complete the AB 540 affidavit on the CADAA.

2. Verifying Eligibility

The CADAA must be filled out EVERY year! This is a FREE application.



If you meet the eligibility requirements, you will be informed that you are eligible to file a CADAA and can click "Start Application."



3. Creating an Account


CREATE A USER ACCOUNT

You will need to provide your name and date of birth, and create a User ID, which must be 8 characters.

Your name and date of birth must match your high school or college records. If you use a different name on your college admissions applications than what was used in high school, you should contact your college/university.

Required fields are marked with a red asterisk (*).


If "Auto Hint" is turned on in the upper right corner, an explanation of what to include for each field will lashown. If this is off, you can click the next to the field for information.



CREATE A USER ACCOUNT (continued)

Student Address: Do not provide a temporary mailing address.

If you do not have a permanent mailing address, you can use an address where you can reliably receive mail, like the address of a friend, relative, or social service agency that has given you permission to use their address.




CREATE A USER ACCOUNT (continued)

Phone Number: Providing a phone number is not required, but is recommended

Email Address: You must provide an email address, as this is used for communication from CSAC and your college.


Double-check the email address to make sure there are no typos. Avoid using high school emails that can expire.

Emails from CSAC may go to your junk or spam folder, so be sure to check these folders and add csac.ca.gov as a "safe sender."



CREATE A USER ACCOUNT (continued)

- 1. You will see a pop up indicating that your account has been created.
- 2. You will receive an email message to confirm your email address. Click on the link in the email message to activate your account. You must activate your account within 24 hours.
- 3. You will be asked to create a password and can then log in to the account.










LOG IN


SELECT SCHOOL YEAR

Select the school year that you plan to attend college. If you select the wrong year, your financial aid will not be processed.

Most students will want to complete the CADAA for next fall, which is the academic year on the left.

If you are applying for an upcoming summer session, it is recommended that you complete applications for both years. Schools have the option of using either the prior or upcoming year's financial aid for summer. Once you've picked a college, check with the financial aid office about summer financial aid.

The application will ask you to confirm your selection.





Read the instructions and

then click on the OK button.

Read these tips first

- 1. Questions with an asterisk (*) require an answer.
- 2. If it is determined that you are a DEPENDENT student, your parent will be required to sign the application. Anytime you make a change to parent information on your application, your parent will be required to sign. Failure to provide a parent signature, will leave your application incomplete. Your college/university cannot award you financial aid if your application is incomplete.
- 3. To prevent loss of application and information, SAVE your application often.
- The red text throughout the CA Dream Act Application means further action is required from you.
- Based on your answers to questions, this application may skip questions that are not required.
- 6. Do not use your web browser's BACK or FORWARD buttons. Using the web browser back or forward button will cause data to be lost. To prevent loss of data you should use the NEXT and PREVIOUS buttons at the bottom of each page. Remember to save often.
- Make sure you submit your application when complete. Saving your application is not the same as submitting your application. Only submitted applications can be processed for financial aid.
- 8. If you need to make changes or corrections after submitting your application, you must wait at least **24 hours**.
- Use the Auto Hint toggle button at the top of the screen to enable or disable help screens.These help screens contain additional information to assist you in answering each question.
- If you file taxes, you must use your 2023 tax information to complete the 2025 2026 CA Dream Act Application.
- Check your Confirmation Page after you submit your application for possible error resolution and to see Action(s) Needed and Next Steps.


Personal Identifiers

VERIFY IDENTITY INFORMATION

Your CADAA will auto-populate your name and date of birth. If you have a valid Social Security Number or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) you can enter it.

Entering your valid SSN or ITIN can help CSAC and campuses match your information to your GPA record.

Leaving this question blank will not impact your eligibility for state aid.



CITIZENSHIP

You will be asked about your citizenship status. If you indicate that you are a citizen or eligible non-citizen, you will be redirected to the FAFSA. If you indicate you are "Neither Citizen nor Eligible Non-citizen" you will continue with the CADAA.

Indicate whether you have a valid U Visa. If you answer yes, you are eligible for the CADAA.



STATE OF RESIDENCE

Enter the state where you reside and the date you began living in that state (month and year only – MM/YYYY).

You must be a California resident to qualify for California student aid such as the Cal Grant, Middle Class Scholarship and in-state tuition.

To qualify for California residency, you must have been living continuously in California for at least 366 days immediately prior to a determination date (set by your institution, i.e. college) and have the intent and capacity to continue to live in California indefinitely.

5. Student Personal Circumstances

- You are asked your marital status. Your status is "single" if you are not legally married, even if you live with or have a boyfriend, girlfriend, partner, or significant other.
- If you are married, your spouse must provide income information. The screens for this process are not included in this guide.



STUDENT COLLEGE OR CAREER PLANS

Indicate what your grade level will be when the 2025-2026 school year begins.




Students who took "dual enrollment" courses in high school should select "First Year (freshman)"



For returning students, this is based on units completed, not the number of years enrolled. For example, if degree completion requires 60 units, a student entering their second year who had completed less than 30 units, would select "First Year (freshman)."

You should answer NO regarding whether you will have your first bachelor's degree unless you have already COMPLETED a bachelor's degree program.



PERSONAL CIRCUMSTANCES

The "Student Personal Circumstances" section is used to determine if a student is independent. Students who qualify as independent do not need to provide information about their parents and eligibility for financial aid is based on the student's income only (and spouse if applicable).

5a. Current & Former Foster Youth

Current and Former Foster Youth

To qualify as a ward of the court or in foster care, a student must have been a dependent of the court and lived in an out-of-home placement at any point on or after their 13th birthday. No guidance is available regarding the difference between being in foster care and being a ward of the court, and so students can check either or both. While this includes foster youth who are under the jurisdiction of the probation system, someone who is incarcerated is not considered a ward of the court for CADAA purposes.

To qualify under the legal guardianship criteria, you must have a guardianship in place currently or when you turned 18. Both kinship guardianships and non-related legal guardianships qualify.

How is Foster Youth Status Verified?

Each college determines if it will require verification of foster care status. Financial aid offices can automatically verify foster care status through a data match with the California Department of Social Services (CDSS); however, this doesn't always happen, and a letter or other acceptable documentation (see next page for options) may be required.

Once verified, status <u>does not need</u> to be redetermined in subsequent years.

Who Can Provide Verification?

College financial aid administrators (FAA) <u>must</u> accept any of the following:

- Court order or official State documentation that the student received Federal or State support in foster care;
- Verification of eligibility for a Chafee Grant;
- A phone call, written statement, from:
 - A State, county, or Tribal agency administering a program under part B or E of title IV of the Social Security Act;
 - A State Medicaid agency;
 - A public or private foster care placing agency or foster care facility or placement;
 - An attorney or Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA);
 - o A financial aid administrator who documented the student's circumstance in the same or a prior award year.





Note: A student living in any of these situations and fleeing an abusive parent may be considered homeless even if the parent would provide support and a place to live.


"Lacking fixed, regular and adequate housing" includes students who:



Are staying with other people temporarily due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason (i.e., couch-surfing)



Are living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations



Are living in emergency shelters



Are living in their car, sleeping outside, or staying someplace not normally meant for human habitation


If you select "yes," you will then be asked who will provide a homeless youth determination.




- If "None of these apply," you can complete the CADAA but must contact the financial aid office for a determination.
- FAAs <u>MUST</u> make a determination based on a written statement, or documented interview, with a student.
- Financial aid administrator's determination of homelessness must be made without regard to the reasons why the student is unaccompanied and/or homeless.

5c. Unusual Circumstances

Student Unusual Circumstances

If a student has already indicated that they have independent student status because they are a current/former foster youth and/or experiencing homelessness, they will NOT be asked the question about unusual circumstances.




Student Unusual Circumstances

Students may complete the CADAA as a "provisionally" independent student if they believe they may qualify for independent status due to unusual situations such as parental abandonment, abuse, neglect, legally granted asylum, or student or parental incarceration or institutionalization (see next page).

Provisional independent provisions may be helpful for youth who are neither homeless nor former foster youth, but who nonetheless have extenuating circumstances that preclude being able to obtain parental information.

If a student has "unusual circumstances", they will be "Provisionally Independent." The student can sign and submit their CADAA without providing parental income information but will need to contact their school to see what supporting documentation they need to submit. A financial aid administrator at the school will review and make a determination regarding a dependency override. Colleges have discretion to use professional judgement when evaluating whether to consider unusual circumstances.



Student Unusual Circumstances

"Unusual circumstances" are situations that prevent you from providing parental information (when required) on the California Dream Act Application (CADAA). The answer to this question can assist the college(s) you select to help you finalize your CADAA application and will often require submission of supporting documentation of your circumstances directly to your college's financial aid office.

You may be experiencing unusual circumstances if:


- You left home due to an abusive or threatening environment.
- You are abandoned by or estranged from your parents.
- · You are separated from your parents, or your parents are displaced in a foreign country.
- You are a victim of human trafficking.
- Your parents are incarcerated, and contact with your parents would pose a risk to you; or
- You are otherwise unable to contact or locate your parents.

6. Student Demographics

Parent Education Status

You will be asked if one or both of your parents attended or completed college. This information is used to identify first-generation college students and is for statistical purposes only.

Selecting "don't know" does not impact eligibility for aid.




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High School Information


You are asked about what your high school completion status will be when you start the 2025–26 school year. Options are a high school diploma, state recognized high school equivalent (e.g., GED, homeschooled, or none of the above).

You can also provide your Statewide Student Identification Number (SSID). This is not required; however, it will help CSAC to match your application to your GPA record to qualify for a CalGrant. The 10-digit number is shown on high school transcripts, or you can ask your school counselor for help.


If you select "state recognized high school equivalent," you will be asked the type of credential (GED, HiSET, TASC or other) and the issuing state.



High School Selection


If you select that you will have a high school diploma, you will be shown fields that allow you to search for your high school by name, state and city.

Note: The purpose of this question is so that high schools can track how many students file the FAFSA and CADAA. High schools do not receive your financial or other information.

When you click the "Search" button, all schools that meet the criteria will appear and you select the correct option from the list.



Student Family Size

Provide the number of people in your family. This includes yourself, spouse and dependent children, if they live with you and you currently provide more than half of their support and will continue to do so between July 1, 2025, and June 30, 2026. This should also include other family members who live with you for whom you will provide more than half of their support between July 1, 2025, and June 30, 2026.

Then, provide the number of people included in your family number who will be in college (including yourself). Most students will answer "1" unless they have a spouse also in college. You should not include anyone other than yourself and your spouse or child (do not include siblings or other members of your household who are attending college).




Tax Filing Status




Student 2023 Tax Return Information: Tax Filers

If you received college grants, scholarships, or AmeriCorps benefits in 2023 and included them on your 2023 tax return, it is important that they be reported on the CADAA. The amount reported will be **DEDUCTED** from your total income and could result in eligibility for more aid.


If you did not file a tax return, you will be asked the questions below. Earned income is typically defined as a combination of any income from employment and contract work. (e.g., Uber, DoorDash, etc.)

If you participated in a need-based employment program enter the amount of your earnings that was from this program. A need-based employment program is employment awarded by a school or other institution to a student based on financial need to meet educational expenses. Common examples include federal work study, fellowships, assistantships, or a learning-aligned employment program.



When asked about current student assets, student financial aid, such as grants or scholarships received for the current term, does NOT need to be reported.

Only those assets indicated here must be reported.





If your income or circumstances have changed, submit the CADAA form and then contact your financial aid office to request an adjustment to the income that is used to calculate your eligibility.

- Examples of special circumstances may include the following:
 - > significant changes to your financial situation, such as loss of employment or pay cuts
 - > tuition expenses at an elementary or secondary school
 - > high amounts of medical or dental expenses not covered by insurance
 - > a family member who recently became unemployed or furloughed
 - Impacted by a federally declared natural disaster such as wildfires, hurricanes, floods or tornados
 - > volatile income that varies from one year to the next, especially if self-employed
 - > other changes in income or assets that may affect your eligibility for federal student aid

Your school may ask you to document your special circumstances so that they can consider making an adjustment to your CADAA information.

- Once you have submitted your application, you will see a Confirmation Page that shows that your CADAA has been submitted. You will also receive an email confirmation that your CADAA was submitted.
- It provides your CA Dream ID number and the date the CADAA was submitted.
- Save or print a copy of the Confirmation Page.
- The Confirmation Page may identify actions you will need to take to ensure that your Dream Act eligibility can be determined.
 Pay close attention to any items that require follow-up.

- Within 24 hours from when you submit your application, a California Student Aid Report (Cal SAR) will be available. The Cal SAR summarizes the information you submitted on the CADAA. Review it to confirm that there aren't any errors.
- After your CADAA is processed, the Cal SAR will include your Student Aid Index (SAI). The SAI
 is used to determine eligibility for student aid. It is not how much aid you are eligible to
 receive.
- Save or print a copy of the Cal SAR.



II. After the CADAA

Apply for a Chafee Grant, if Eligible

- Eligibility: Current or former foster youth who were dependents or wards of the court at least one day between 16–18
- Up to \$5,000 for up to 5 years until age 26.
- Can be used at public or private colleges, universities or career and technical schools in California or out of state.
- Must be enrolled at least half-time.





Chafee Grant Application Tips

- A separate application is required for first-time applicants in addition to the FAFSA/CADAA (chafee.csac.ca.gov).
- You only need to fill out the Chafee application once.
- Apply as soon as possible.
- Planned School of Attendance refers to one college the student plans to attend. If the school isn't listed, contact CSAC. If the school changes, the student must inform CSAC to receive the award.
- Depending on the availability of funding, students may be wait-listed.








Check Your Award Status







If an Award Status is pending, students should click on their "To Do" list to determine next steps. If the Award Status is "Not Awarded," click on "Reason" to learn more and consult with the financial aid office or CSAC if you believe there is an error.

Example: Award Pending for Chafee Grant

Note that the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) verification for the Chafee grant only happens monthly and may therefore not appear immediately.



Claim Your CalKIDS Account



- CalKIDS is a college savings account that was set up for you by the State of California.
- If you attended a California public K-12 school during the 2021-22 school year, you may have up to \$1,000 in free money in your CalKIDS to use at an eligible college, university, technical or vocational institution.
- Once funds are requested, they are sent to your institution and treated like a scholarship. They can pay for qualified higher education expenses like tuition and fees, books and supplies and computer equipment. You can use these funds up to the age of 26.

Claim Your CalKIDS Account



To claim your account at **calkids.org**, you'll need the following info:

- 1. California county where you attended school in the 2021–22 school year.
- 2. Your date of birth.
- 3. Statewide Student Identifier (SSID). You can find your SSID on your high school transcript or ask your counselor for help.

Congrats! You Did It!

Remember:

- Continue to check your email and college student portal weekly. The college will communicate with you if they need more information. Even after college starts, continue to check it often.
- Respond promptly to any information requests, such as a verification of foster youth or homeless youth status or additional income verification.
- Update all your accounts if your address, email or phone number changes (e.g. WebGrants, college portal, CADAA, etc.)
- Apply for other scholarships and campus support programs such as NextUp, Guardian Scholars, EOP, EOPS, or Disability Student Services.
- Maintain your grades and don't drop too many classes. Once you receive financial aid, there are academic requirements you need to meet to keep receiving it. Check online for your college's "Satisfactory Academic Progress" policies.
- Reapply for aid by submitting the CADAA every year!




